"I've been working overseas since 1988 when I became a Small Business Volunteer on the island of Kosrae in Micronesia. The island had five villages but one wasn't connected by the road so you had to take a fishing boat or hike thru the jungle to get there. I backpacked in Asia for about 10 months after I COSed then taught English in Japan to save money for grad school; I went to Thunderbird. Since then, I've worked for Peace Corps as a PST trainer in Mongolia and as a PTO in Kazakhstan and then mostly with USAID as Program Officer, with a few other contracts with UNICEF, the EU and MSI. I met a man when I was working in Baghdad the second time with MSI who is from South Africa and we have a cattle farm in the Kalahari near the Botswana border. I'm just finishing up a short term contract with USAID in Sri Lanka and now heading to the US to travel by plane, train and rental car to see family and friends and places I haven't been to before, Oregon being one of those places, so I'm looking forward to meeting you all and hearing about your Peace Corps experiences and Oregon!"

This day is in honor of Martin Luther King Jr. Instead of attending regular classes, students attend an assembly, workshops and a rally with a guest speaker to broaden their awareness, understanding and appreciation of diversity.

This year, Denise Silfee (Thailand 2011-2013), Jennifer Knowles (Macedonia 2009-2011), Tricia Buzzard (Honduras 2011-2012, Fiji 2012-2014), Kathleen Conery (Guinea 2013-2014 & Malawi 2015 – 2017), Charles Goldsmith (Mexico 2009-2012), Juliet Bender (Mexico 2009-2012), and Laurette Gardner (Madagascar 2004-2006) shared their experiences to about 175 students during the three sessions. The day was a complete success. It is likely that one of those students will one day be sworn is as a PCV.

Oregon PCV Project Spotlight

The WCPCA board received a request from Panama PCV and former Oregon Duck Chelsea Mackin for project funding for a Women's Biodiversity Seminar. Chelsea is an extension volunteer and lives in Chitre, the provincial capital of Herrera. The project will invite women from all over the country to attend a multi-day seminar. This project is in conjunction with Seeders, the Peace Corps Panama seed bank, which offers resources to support agricultural and environmental projects across the country. Chelsea's fund-

raising goal was \$3565 and she had collected 37% of the total at the time of the request. The WCPCA board voted to donate \$300 towards Chelsea's project.

Help prepare forest trails for forestry education programs, which serve over 1,500 middle school students each year. The experiential program teaches students about how to sustainably manage forest habitat for timber, wildlife, and clean water. The work includes picking up winter debris, weeding along the trail edge, and spreading wood chips and gravel. Before
