The 2016 calendars include beautiful photos from Peace Corps countries, including Namibia, Moldova, Jordan, Peru, Sierra Leone, Ecuador, Thailand, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Poland, Mexico, and Turkey, most of which are countries where WCPCA RPCVs served.

Volunteers. RCPV and chef Jeem Peterson (Philippines 1982-85, Solomon Islands 1995-97) promised a delicious meal and by all accounts he delivered with the help of several assistant cooks and kitchen helpers. The cucumber salad seemed to be a hit, too.

Approximately 175 meals were served, close to the goal of 200, with the steaming leftovers delivered by committee member James Cloutier (Kenya 1964-66) to the homeless camp at River Road and Chambers in West Eugene. He described the recipients of the hot meals as quite appreciative.

The committee that organised the event believes it would be good to consider doing it again and using lessons learned this year to improve. If you want to help next time, please contact a Board member (names listed at end of this newsletter, contact information found in the directory).

After subtracting for expenses, WCPCA cleared about \$1500, counting sales of many 2016 Peace Corps calendars (see side bar to get yours; only a few remain!). An added benefit was that WCPCA members connected with several RPCVs who have not been active or involved with the group. We hope they stay in touch with us and become new members.

The Board has already voted to contribute \$750 of the raised funds to the project of Southern Oregon native Coleen Bremner who is currently serving in The Gambia. Her project, a GLOW camp for both young women and young men, has partnered with First Lady Michelle Obama's Let Girls Learn initiative (Let Girls Learn).

GLOW (Girls Leading Our World) camps started in Romania in 1995 and been presented in 60 developing countries worldwide by Peace Corps Volunteers since then. They generally focus on girls but at times PCVs include boys as well, recognising that empowering girls takes the efforts of all citizens. In this project, two 10th grade girls and two 10th grade boys from multiple schools and three teachers from three senior secondary schools in the region will participate, according to the PCPP website. During the seven-day camp, students will participate in sessions that concentrate on three main areas: gender equity, community involvement, and healthy home life.

The Gambia's population is young: around 59.7 percent of the

population is below 25 years old. The Gambia has achieved some noticeable progress towards gender equity, but female children have remained disadvantaged and vulnerable to limited access to education compared to the boys in the same household.

Objectives of the project include: encouraging participants to analyse the benefits and consequences of gender roles, gender issues, and gender empowerment in the culture; educating participants on reproductive and sexual health, HIV/AIDS, sexually-transmitted infections, healthy relationships, and family planning; and using life skills sessions to focus on communication, public speaking, and decision making to build self-confidence in participants. The camp will take place January 17-24, 2016.

The remaining proceeds from "Curry for a Cause" will be help in restricted funds pending future Peace Corps Partnership Projects by Oregon Volunteers and supporting girls' education.


February 11, 2016
