Camp GLOW (Girls and Guys Leading Our World) 2016 has been one of the highlights of my service. It was a chance for six teachers and 24 grade ten students, two boys and two girls from six schools to come together for a week and create something magical.

We ran around the week before camp like chickens with our heads cut off. We were trying to finalize last minute details, shop for everything, make sure counterparts were booked. We were exhausted and camp had not even begun yet. On the first day we eagerly awaited the campers' arrival. As schools showed up we welcomed them to camp.

The week was full of different activities and discussions about gender equality, community involvement, and healthy home life. One day we had a gender swap relay race where campers had to perform activities that are usually associated with the other gender. Girls had to plow the fields and count back change, while boys ran with water buckets on their heads and carried babies on their backs. Discussions that evening focused on such difficult issues as marrying too young, sugar daddies, sexual harassment, mental health, and suicide. These tenth grade girls have been through so much already and still realize the value of education and want to make the best of themselves.

We played volleyball, ate various kids of American foods, i.e., pancakes, and watched the film Mulan. They really enjoyed the movie and understood the key concepts and ideas. This is the day that I realized the campers were really starting to feel empowered and find their own personal voices. I saw them walk into camp not sure about how to be or how to behave and several days later they were sitting on the step laughing and talking about their ideas and dreams. It made me cry, not because of what we had done, but because of how truly wonderful the students were.

On the last day of camp, we held our closing ceremonies and Peace Corps The Gambia's Country Director Jennifer Goette and US Ambassador Patricia Alsup were in attendance. We gave out

I am so proud of the work we put into this event and the results of it. Not only were the campers' lives changed, so were ours.


