

Patricia Edmisten is the author of the The Mourning of Angels which takes place in Peru. It captures the innocence of 1962 and 1963, before the Kennedy assassination, when many, swept up in the idealism of such a venture, joined the Peace Corps and journeyed to countries they'd never heard of, and when young women seized the opportunity for a kind of adventure that until then had almost solely been the purview of men. Lydia Schaefer, Edmisten's 23-year-old protagonist is from Milwaukee, Wisconsin and assigned to Peru. She is a tough, principled, sometimes provocative, but always emotionally receptive young woman, determined to do her job as a health care worker, first in Arequipa, and later in the coastal town of Ica.


