October Potluck



Dear Fellow RPCVs in Eugene,

The summer is ending, and the teachers are back, preparing for the new school year. They were surprised and excited to see that their rooms had whiteboards that replaced the old green boards.

We held the first training this week. In the morning, the teachers from grades six through nine attended, and in the afternoon the teachers from grades one through five came. Fellow Peace Corps volunteer and her counterpart from her school came to talk to the teachers about student-centered teaching using our new technology - Mimio interactive system and the projector - with the new whiteboards. They also talked about their experience developing classroom management techniques for keeping children engaged in class, which was really helpful and offered some moments of hilarity. Miron, my counterpart for this project, gave a tour of the contents of our new system, highlighting the ways this system can put new life into the classes being taught. Stacie followed up with a tutorial about downloading videos teachers want to show in their classes.

In the end, I realized that a number of teachers were probably feeling overwhelmed by all the new technology being introduced, so Miron and I offered to help any teacher that had an idea of something they wanted to offer their class. We will help them go step by step to the finished product. Hopefully, if this help is available, more teachers, beyond those that are tech savvy, will be willing to learn how to use the system.

Next up, there will be workshops this fall that teachers have volunteered to teach as part of this project, in math, physics, online safety and security, Microsoft Office programs, history, physical education. Stay tuned . . .

Throughout the fall, we will be asking for feedback from the teachers on what difference they see in their classrooms, both their teaching and the students' engagement, with the presence of the whiteboards. There will be ongoing training to enhance teachers' understanding of student-centered teaching.

Once again, thank you for your support in our effort to enhance the education of the girls in Macedonia.
